The Coppin Heights Community Development Corporation is committed to making the Greater Coppin Heights/Rosemont Community a safer place to live, however, we need your help in making this happen. Here are some tips regarding protecting yourself and your home.

Porch Lighting

Turn on your front porch light as well as your backyard light. You can have your porch light

connected to a photo cell which will automatically turn on your porch light when it becomes dark. Knowing that your porch light is on when you are not at home will add to your confidence that your home is secure.

Additionally porch lighting makes your home a less welcoming place for loitering, invasion, and other criminal activities.

Motion Detection

Lighting

Motion detection lighting is the single most effective way to increase the security of your home besides locking your doors. These lights use very little energy because they only come on at night when activated by motion within their range.

ARE YOU READY TO VOTE?

IMPORTANT FACTS YOU NEED TO KNOW

February 12, 2008 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.	<u>Presidential Primary Election</u>
November 4, 2008 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.	<u>Presidential Election</u>

1. I am not registered. Can I register now? Yes, but you will not be able to vote in the primary election on Feb 12th. The deadline to register was January 22, 2008. You should register now so that you will be ready to vote in the General election November 4, 2008.

The deadline for November 4th is October 14, 2008.

2. What should I do if I moved to another county within the State or to Baltimore City?

You should provide your new address to the local board of elections in your new jurisdiction.

3. How do I update my voter registration? You must notify the local board of elections where you currently live if your voter registration information has changed. If you complete a change of address form at the MVA, this information will be sent to your local board of elections for processing, unless you indicate that you do not want to change your voter registration information. You can also send changes on a voter registration application or on any other signed written notice. If you do not receive a Voter Notification Card with your updated

information three weeks after you submit information, you should contact the local board of elections where you now live to ensure that your records are up-to-date.

4. May I change parties? Yes, except after November 19, 2007. To change your party affiliation, submit a new voter registration application or a written request to your local board of elections. If you request a change in party affiliation after November 19, 2007, your request will be held at the local board of elections and processed when registration reopens after the Primary Election.

5. How do I verify my registration? You are considered a registered voter when you receive your Voter Notification Card from your local board of elections. If you do not receive your card three weeks after you submit an application, you should contact your local board of elections. Registration is permanent as long as you continue to live in Maryland and keep your name and address current with your local board of elections. You do not have to re-register when you move within the State, but you must keep your address current.

6. How do I apply if I am a non-Maryland resident? If you are not a Maryland resident, you may register to vote in your home state using the National Voter Registration Form.

7. Voting Rights for 17 Year Olds An individual who is 17 years old may vote in the 2008 Presidential Primary Election,

provided:· The individual will be 18 years old on or before November 4, 2008 (the date of the Presidential General Election); and the individual is registered to vote and is affiliated with the Democratic or Republican Party.

8. Restoration of Voting Rights in Maryland

Can I have my voting rights restored in Maryland if I have previously been convicted of a felony?

Effective, July 1, 2007, if you have been convicted of a felony and have completed serving a court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, including any term of parole or probation for the conviction, you are eligible to register to vote. You do not qualify to register to vote if you have been convicted of buying or selling votes.

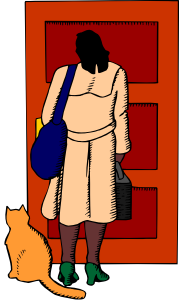

Lead and Children in Coppin Heights

FREE HOUSING SERVICES FOR HOMEOWNERS AND RENTERS

Lead is a highly toxic metal used in building materials since the late 1700s; however, residential use of lead-based paint was just outlawed in the U.S. in 1978 despite the adverse affects of lead being recognized since Benjamin Franklin wrote about them in 1786. Although there has been a ban on the residential use of lead-based for 30 years, many children continue to be exposed to lead through paint, dust, and soil because homes built prior to 1978 very likely still contain lead paint. Children under the age of 6 and pregnant women are most affected by lead. Elevated blood lead levels in children can cause hyperactivity, learning disabilities, aggressive behavior, and attention disorders.

Stoppin' Lead in Coppin (SLC) is a new program for families in the Greater Coppin Heights/Rosemont area. The program will help protect educate you on how to keep your family LEAD FREE. SLC provides community trainings on lead safety, lead-safe work practices (if you are renovating your home), legal rights, as well as hazard identification. If you are a renter, we can help you, too! Our services are available to both homeowners and renters. We offer in-home assessments, using the Notice of Defect to inform landlords of problems. SLC offers **FREE** access to our HEPA Vacuum Loan Program. HEPA Vacuums are special vacuums that are excellent for reducing dust and other indoor asthma triggers because unlike regular vacuums, HEPA vacuums retain 99.97% of the particles they pick up.

We are also promoting a **FREE** window replacement program through the Coalition to End Childhood Lead Poisoning's Operation LEAP Baltimore. Residents are now able to replace your old wooden windows (a major source of lead exposure) with new, safer windows.
