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
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CARE PACKAGE IDEAS FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS-

Causes of Gun Violence Among Young Black Males

Coppin has received a two-year, \$100,290 grant, to study the attitudes and reasons that spark young African American males in urban areas pick up and carry guns, to reduce the problem. The grant was awarded to CSU by the Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCFF), who received a \$1 million grant by the National Collaborative for Gun Violence Research. Lead investigator at CSU, Dr. Johnny Rice, II, assistant professor of criminal justice, and a selected team of CSU students will investigate the contemporary causes of gun violence, specifically exploring why Black males ages 15-24 in marginalized urban communities possess and carry guns.

WHAT'S COOKING IN THE RESIDENCE HALL?

Microwave Spaghetti squash and meatballs

Ingredients:

1 spaghetti squash
 1 tablespoon oil
 salt, to taste.
 pepper, to taste.
 12 meatballs, fully cooked
 2 cups pasta sauce
 grated parmesan cheese, to serve.
 fresh parsley, chopped, to serve.



Directions:

Slice the spaghetti squash in half. If you are having difficulty, poke some holes with a knife and then microwave for 5 minutes.

Scoop out the seeds and innards with a spoon, then rub oil, salt, and pepper all over the surface.

Microwave for about 10-15 minutes until the squash is tender and pulls away from the skin easily.

Using a fork, shred the squash into noodle-like strands.

Microwave the meatballs with the pasta sauce, covered, for about 2 minutes or until the meatballs are fully heated through.

Spoon the meatballs and sauce on top of each spaghetti squash half, garnish with the Parmesan and parsley
